<p>Procedure</p> <p>To include home languages in the Seachtain na Gaeilge initiative, Irish teachers, other language teachers and language support teachers can look at Irish Proverbs with students. The following are some activities that could be carried out:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students are invited to give the equivalent or an alternative proverb in another MFL or their home language • Poster competition • The same proverb can be displayed in multiple languages • Variations- Guess the proverb's language/meaning • Students are invited to re-jig a popular proverb or create new ones
